#### Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

#### **Opinions**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Net Position, Revenue, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and Cash Flows of the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc., as of and for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc.'s basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the net position of the Authority as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its net position and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

#### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc.'s basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 25, 2024 on our consideration of the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. #### NOTE 1 - Summary of Organization, Activities

<u>Organization</u> – The Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc. (the Fund) is incorporated under the Nonprofit Corporation Law of 1988 of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (NPCL). The Fund is organized and operated exclusively for the following charitable, educational, and scientific purpose within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended (the Code):

To establish an organization to support community development, downtown revitalization, historic preservation and blight remediation in historic downtowns and low/moderate income areas of townships, village centers and boroughs, and without otherwise limiting its powers, engaging in any lawful act or activity in furtherance of its purposes and for which a nonprofit corporation may be formed under NPCL, and which may be undertaken by a corporation that is exempt from taxation under the Code.

Through an administrative agreement with the Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster (Redevelopment Authority), the Redevelopment Authority manages, oversees and operates the everyday activities of the Fund. Redevelopment Authority personnel are also responsible for maintaining accurate financial records, facilitating the payment of operational expenses, and all external financial reporting.

The Board of Directors is comprised of five (5) members in accordance with the Bylaws of the Fund. Each member of the Board of the Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster has been elected to serve as a director of the Fund for the same term as his or her term as a director on the board of the Redevelopment Authority.

<u>Activities</u> – The Fund serves as a funding platform for private contributions supporting projects of the Lancaster County Land Bank Authority, the Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster, and any other qualified recipients as determined by the Board of Directors.

#### NOTE 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

#### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### Report Presentation

The financial statements included in this report were prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in the United States of America.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and the Fund notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are stated at cost, which approximates market value. Cash and cash equivalents include cash in bank, certificates of deposit, petty cash, and other investments with original maturities of less than three months from date of purchase.

#### Net Asset Classes

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board and AU 958-205, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations".

The financial statements are presented in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958 dated August 2016, and the provisions of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) "Audit and Accounting Guide for Not-for-Profit Organizations" (the "Guide"). ASC 958-205 was effective January 1, 2018.

The Fund has presented its financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for not-for-profit organizations in the United States of America. Under this guidance, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of under provisions of the Guide, net assets and revenues, and gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, the net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified as follows:

- Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objectives of the Organization. The Organization's board may designate assets without restrictions for specific operational purposes from time to time.
- Net Assets With Donor Restrictions: Net Assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors, and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the Corporation or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, where by the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity

#### Revenue Recognition

The Fund receives funding through contributions from private sources.

The Fund receives contributions from individuals and corporation and private foundations and recognizes revenues under ASU 2018-8 Topic 968-605. Under Topic 605, there are two indicators. A donor- imposed condition which is defined as a donor stipulation that represents a barrier that must be overcome before the recipient is entitled to the assets transferred or promised. The second is an unconditional contribution without donor-imposed conditions and the related revenue is recognized in the period it is received. The Fund also considered whether revenue should be recognized overtime or at a point in time.

The Fund has determined that some of the contributions received contain a barrier to overcome to be entitled to the assets transferred. When those barriers are overcome those contributions will be transferred from Net Assts with Donor Restrictions to Net Assets without Donor Restrictions.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Fund is tax exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) and 509 (a) 2 of the Internal Revenue Code, and therefore no provision for federal income tax is required. The preparation of financial

#### Income Taxes

The Fund is tax exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) and 509 (a) 2 of the Internal Revenue Code, and therefore no provision for federal income tax is required. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Organization to report information regarding its exposure to various tax positions taken by the Organization.

The Fund has determined whether any tax positions have met the recognition threshold and has measured the Organization's exposure to those tax positions. Management believes that the Fund has adequately addressed all relevant tax positions and that there are no unrecorded tax liabilities. Federal and state tax authorities generally have the right to examine and audit the previous three years of tax returns filed. Any interest or penalties assessed to the Corporation are recorded in operating expenses. No interest or penalties from federal or state tax authorities were recorded in the accompanying financial statements

All tax exempt entities are subject to review and audit by federal, state and other applicable agencies. Such agencies may review the taxability of unrelated business income, or the qualification of the tax-exempt entity under the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state statutes. With few exceptions, the Fund is no longer subject to U.S. federal income tax examinations for years before 2019.

#### NOTE 3 - Related Party Transactions

#### Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster

The Fund is co-located with the Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster. The Fund contracts with the Redevelopment Authority for administrative services, which are invoiced quarterly based on the actual amount of time Redevelopment Authority personnel spend on Fund business. Billing for administrative services from the Redevelopment Authority amounted to \$25,609 for 2023, and \$8,988 for 2022.

As of December 31, 2023 the Fund did not release any funds to the Redevelopment Authority of the County of Lancaster. At December 31, 2022 grants paid out of \$5,314 were related to the property located at 332 Locust Street to pay for an overdue sewer bill in order to proceed with the demolition of the property.

#### Lancaster County Land Bank Authority

For the year ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, The Fund did not award any grants to the Land Bank.

#### NOTE 4 – Fixed Assets

Capital assets consist primarily of expenditures to acquire, construct, place in operation and improve the facilities of the Redevelopment Fund Inc. and are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. A property at 132-136 South Prince Street was acquired for \$762,447 during the current fiscal year.

#### NOTE 5 – Contributions Received

The Fund received contributions from four organizations totaling \$911,518 and \$87,927 for the years ended December 31, 2023, and 2022 respectively.

#### NOTE 6 - Grants Awarded

At December 31, 2023 grants paid out were \$100,158 related to the properties at Prince Street. At December 31, 2022 grants paid out of \$5,314 were related to the property located at 332 Locust Street to pay for an overdue sewer bill in order to proceed with the demolition of the property.

#### NOTE 7 – Concentration of Credit Risk

The Organization maintains its cash accounts at one bank. The cash balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At times, these balances may exceed the federal insurance limit; however the Organization has not experienced any losses with respect to its bank balances in excess of government provided insurance. Management believes that no significant concentration of credit risk exists with respect to these cash balances at December 31, 2023 and 2022.

#### Note 8 - Contingency

The COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption through mandated and voluntary closings of businesses. While the disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration of the closings. The total financial impact on the Company and the duration cannot be estimated at this time.

#### NOTE 9 - Cash, Cash Equivalents and Restricted Cash Presented in the Statement of Cash Flows

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc. ("the Authority") as of and for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc.'s basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated June 25, 2024.

#### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency or combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

#### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Lancaster Redevelopment Fund, Inc. financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.
